Why is the PMP Exam changing?

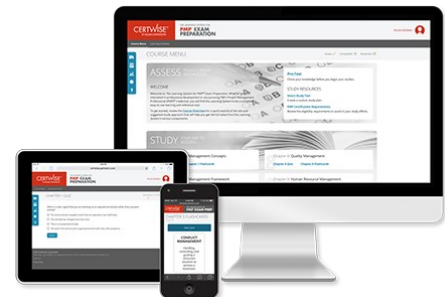
- The project management profession continues to evolve
- The roles and responsibilities of project managers are changing
- Every three to five years, PMI conducts a Role Delineation Study to capture these changes
- The PMP Exam Content Outline (ECO) is updated based on this study to ensure the PMP exam reflects current practices

How is the PMP Exam changing?

- A new 2020 PMP ECO was released on June 30, 2019
- The ECO contains significant changes:
 - Five domains reduced to three domains (People, Process, Business Environment)
 - 50% of questions will cover Agile and Hybrid
 - Knowledge and skills associated with each domain

What is staying the same?

- Eligibility requirements
- PMP exam length and format
- *PMBOK® Guide*—Sixth Edition

Why complete PMP Exam by 31 Dec.?

- ✓ The current exam is “known” and there should be fewer surprises; peers and instructors can share their advice
- ✓ This course and study materials are designed for the current exam
- ✓ If you don’t pass by 31 December, you can upgrade to updated online study materials **for free**, for the remainder of your access period

Why take PMP Exam on/after 2 Jan.?

- ✓ You can’t commit enough study time to prepare by 31 December
- ✓ The current course covers a substantial portion of the exam material and will still benefit you on the updated exam
- ✓ You can upgrade to the updated online study materials **for free** as soon as they are available for the remainder of your access period
